Members' Recital at SonRise Church

Sunday, May 5 at 4:00 pm: Our annual Members' Recital was held at SonRise Church in Fallbrook, where we played the church's 1984 two-manual and pedal Casavant Frères Opus 3588 organ (Saint Hyacinthe, Quebec). Special thanks to SonRise organist John Redford, who put the recital on the church's calendar (but could not attend), SonRise Pastor Greg Coppack, who coordinated the practice schedule; Michael Munson, who coordinated performers, printed the program, and emceed the program; Barbara Ollivares, who arranged dinner at Estrella's; and Carol Graham, who manned and secured the church from noon until 5 pm. Dr. Michael Munson, who organized the event, recalled, "There were about 35 people in attendance, and Carol said the offering took in about \$140, which she gave to the SonRise church. The recital lasted an hour, and I think the audience enjoyed it. About twelve of us went to Estrella's Mexican restaurant in Fallbrook afterwards at the suggestion of Barbara and Al Ollivares and enjoyed talking. I don't think anyone remembered to take any pictures, unfortunately."

Introduction to the King of Instruments Class


Carol Graham, Palomar AGO Education Chair

Introduction to the King of Instruments Class was held Saturday May 4, 2019 at St. Thomas More Catholic Church, in Oceanside. Ten youths attended the 2 hour class. The event was coordinated by Carol Graham, education chair and Sally Fay, organist at St. Thomas More. Sally and Chuck Fay generously sponsored the expenses involved with the church and made arrangements. Chuck was recovering from heart surgery and was not able to attend.

Attendees were greeted by a Phantom performance of "Phancotta" by Carol. Howard McCullough demonstrated the organ with attendees observing close by. Cheryl Holzer and Dr. Michael Munson talked about educational and career opportunities involving the organ. Last year's Scholarship winner, Kim Tran played "Gabriel's Oboe". Each attendee played a piece on the 3 Manual Allen Renaissance organ and was able to experience the wonders of the organ. 3 boys showed their continuing interest by auditioning on piano in the Organ Scholarship Auditions held May 11. (More on that next month.)

A highlight of the event was a scenario depicting the death of Louis Vierne at the Notre Dame organ in 1937. Michael Munson played the part of Vierne and prepared an Improvisation based on a theme which he read from a real piece of Braille script. He suddenly collapsed onto the console with his foot holding down the low E pedal. His life ended there doing what he loved doing the most. (Yes, this really happened!)

Each attendee was given a packet with information about Youth Day at the 2019 West Region Convention, a Trivia Quiz, a sheet of Braille and full color photos of German organs given by Charlotte Atkinson, and scholarship information. PIZZA Followed outside for all including parents.

"Countess"

In the San Diego North County City of Vista there is an example of a very beautiful 19th century Hacienda. This photo is from the lovely inner garden area. The main building is the Rancho Guajome Adobe. There is a beautiful covered inner pathway that surrounds the entire garden area. The building was built during 1852 and 1853. It was made a National Historical Landmark in 1970.



Descendants of the owner, Cave Couts, Jr., who died in 1943, had willed the property to his housekeeper, Mrs. Ida Richardson. Her descendants lived in the Adobe until 1974 when the San Diego County purchased the ranch house and surrounding ranch land. It is now part of the Rancho Guajome Adobe Country Park in the County of San Diego Department of Parks and Recreation.




More history of the family reveals that the Rancher's son, Cave Couts, Jr., was married to Lily Bell Clemens in 1886. She must have been a musician as he purchased an important instrument for her. He had the "west inner patio" of the 7,300 square foot adobe ranch house enclosed. This is now referred to as the "covered porch". This is where the instrument is still located.

The instrument is a Mason and Hamlin three manual reed organ. In the 1870s and 80s they were acclaimed by awards of excellence

throughout Europe including London, Paris, Sweden, Vienna and in addition were granted awards in Philadelphia, PA. Two and three manual models of reed organs can still be found in old churches in Europe and are still in wider use there today than in America.

"It is likely that the organ came across the States by rail from the Mason and Hamlin piano and organ factory in Boston," Dr. Jerry Colling relates. "This three manual, (three keyboard-tiers) organ's more than 700 brass reeds generate 676 different musical voices through more than 12 full sets of brass reeds on 4 wind chests, selected by the organist by pulling the draw knob 'stops' next to the 3 keyboards. Couplers and an expression pedal enhance a variety of sounds. In addition to the three manual keyboards played by the hands, two octaves of bass notes are played with the feet. Therefore the organist had no extra feet to pump the air, so a helper had to pump a hand lever at the right side of the organ for the bellows. Now the wind is furnished by a vacuum motor in the next room connected to the organ by a flexible tube. The cost of 'The Countess' in 1890 was about \$2,400."

Of interest is that the Richardson estate auctioned the contents of the house around 1970 and the organ was purchased by "Dutch" Parker of Bonsall. In 1997 when the Adobe was open to the public as a Park, Mr. Parker asked the head Ranger, Diane Kennedy, if she would like to have the organ returned to the Adobe. She visited Mr. Parker's home and when she saw the organ she accepted this generous donation. The organ was returned to Guajome on January 12, 1998.



Chris Magalion, who later became a docent of the adobe, was a collector of reed organs and when he saw this organ he recommended to Diane that the organ be restored by Wendell Shoberg, a master pipe organ builder in Ramona. Through generous donated funds the organ was finally completely restored, and on January 25, 2002 it was returned to the Adobe where it now resides in the "covered patio".

On November 30, 2002 it was played by AGO members as well as Chris Magalion and Jerry Colling for "An Old Fashioned Christmas" celebration at Guajome and on May 25th Dutch Parker played on the restored "Countess". Mr. Shoberg now maintains the organ and it is featured by concerts during annual events like "Rancho Christmas, Adobe Days Fiesta and tours.

Dr. Colling would be pleased to give you or a group of your friends and family a tour of the Adobe, tell you about its history and play for you on the Countess and.... if you are a keyboardist you can even try it out yourself!
