Our May members recital is cancelled. Or perhaps I should say postponed, although we have not scheduled backup dates. At this time we do not know if we're having our June dinner meeting and installation of officers. Certainly we cannot until our governor relaxes the stay at home orders. Perhaps some of you have been laid of your church jobs. I understand that there may be State or Federal Government aid if you are a 1099 contractor. # Charlotte's Web

### The Final Curtain, by Carol Graham

Charlotte Atkinson finished spinning her earthly web on Saturday, May 2, 2020. During her 87+ years, she "caught" a lot of musicians and potential musicians with her passion for and devotion to music making. The transition to the Heavenly Realm happened quickly and to the end she was busy spinning words of love and care to the many people who had filled her life.

In 1982, I became a part of "the web" as Charlotte's neighbor in Vista. We had a lot in common since we were both church organists and piano teachers. My son, Mike took lessons from Charlotte and is still good friends with her son, David. Some of my favorite memories are of what we called "Music on the Hill", a music camp for our students during the summer. We incorporated lots of fun musical activities and as walked back and forth to our studios on the hill and then Down the hill to All Saints Episcopal Church for introduction to the organ. Charlotte delighted in thinking up creative, fun ideas for children to enjoy with music. Her studio was full of all kinds of instruments - big, small and toy. She never lost that childlike wonder of what is simple and beautiful.



Charlotte dedicated herself to musical excellence. Her years of promoting AGO kept our Palomar Chapter from extinction in the 1970s. In 1988, Charlotte headed up the committee to bring the AGO Regional Convention to Carlsbad. Our chapter still benefits financially from the profit we made at that convention. While her husband Bill was on the staff of the Army & Navy Academy in Carlsbad, Charlotte was responsible for procuring the 3-manual Schlicker organ for the Chapel on the beach at the Academy. Some of our members remember the excellent concerts there. Bill (a professional flutist) and Charlotte were the "Atkinson Duo". Foreign exchange students, cadets and private students kept in touch with Charlotte as adults and brought her much joy.

The list of Charlotte's musical accomplishments is extensive. Additionally, she was always studying, learning and writing. During the past 5 years since she moved to Temecula, I collaborated with her on the book called "The New School of Practical Church Music", a humorous look at the changing world of church music. She was pleased that \$2,000 in book sales/donations have been added to the Scholarship Fund.

I hope other chapter members who have memories will contribute to "Charlotte's Web" in the next months. At some point, there will be a Memorial Service, but in the meantime, share your thoughts and memories by emailing them to Dean Henry Doktorski.

July 15, 2010: Charlotte Atkinson is an organist extraordinaire! Showing an aptitude for music early on, Charlotte continued with formal education earning Bachelor and Masters degrees in music. At San Diego State University, she first met her husband, William, in Howard Brubeck's theory class. In her junior year at SDSU, she and William (Bill) were married and spent the next several decades touring as the Atkinson Duo with Charlotte on piano, organ and harpsichord and Bill on flute and choir directing. They were organist and music directors of several churches and were actively involved in many service and musical organizations. They were mostly involved locally with the Army and Navy Academy in Carlsbad and the First Presbyterian Church in Oceanside. Charlotte is now in her 40th year of serving the First Presbyterian Church. Somehow, among a myriad of other activities, they also managed to operate the Music Makers retail store in Carlsbad and the Atkinson Handbell Supply company for several years. Charlotte also had numerous opportunities to perform in Europe in many famous churches, including some where J. S. Bach had performed. Charlotte has her own pipe organ at home that Bill built for her. She continues to perform and teach professionally.


# **Education Notes**

# Adapting to the Lockdown

Cheryl Holzer tells us, "My church job situation:

Fallbrook United Methodist is doing Facebook live services on Sundays at 10 am. There are four (4) of us present including the minister, choir director (now soloist) and minister's husband. A funny thing happened on Easter Sunday. A choir member showed up at church! She is an older lady with dementia. The minister let her stay but told her not to do it again.

**First Church of Christ, Scientist Carlsbad-Vista:** This church is doing Zoom services with no music. I play for this church on Wednesday nights. For the performing arts, the pandemic has been very challenging!"



Jerry Colling, M. D., writes, "I'm a 60 year member of Carlsbad Community Church. Of course we're hearing Dr. Lee Hamby's sermon along with a praise team each Sunday morning until we can safely get together in our Worship Center. Our organist, Mary Ellen Chanco, is not a Chapter member but I self-appointed myself to keep connected to AGO's cause."

George Butterfield tells us, "Fourth Church of Christ, Scientist has operated online since March 22. Details at <a href="www.christiansciencelajolla.com">www.christiansciencelajolla.com</a>. Organ Stop recently completed updating all four music catalogs. Used popular music was sent out last week ago and orders have been processed. Due to the cancellation of the National conventions of both AGO and ATOS, we may have an opportunity to sell more music. Our goal has been for several years to sell all remaining stock of sheet music and focus on the organ business."

Peter L. Bates writes, "What's going on with me? Well, the church remains closed to the public, however, we are streaming services each week and I'm recording a 20-25 minute organ meditation each week using the tech crew that records the service. I do much of my work at home but go into the church to prepare the organ for the recordings, check my mail and do some administrative work. Staff meetings, bible studies and Board meetings are through zoom. All full-time and some part-time staff at Covenant continue to be paid

full salary. Most of the part-time staff have been furloughed. Our paid quartet sings 3 choral anthems and 2 hymns for each streamed service and I also play a prelude to the service. They rehearse 1 hour before we record and I give them the music for the following week. None of the volunteer choir members or office volunteers are allowed into the buildings. Peter continues, "As with all chapters, you are finding it necessary to cancel, or significantly postpone all gatherings. I wondered if you might consider a Facebook live event. The Los Angeles Chapter held one in March for the Aaron David Miller concert. When everything was shut down in California, Aaron was already in the air headed for San Marino to prepare for his recital. Some quick thinking of a few members saved that event and it was enjoyed by many more than would have actually attended the program. What equipment necessary? An iPhone 11. No special camera, no special microphones. I was planning on attending, but when I received an e-mail suggesting that people of my age category may be turned away, I decided to watch on-line. The camera location was fixed, but the sound was great. I was astonished to find out that all was done with the iPhone. Perhaps your member's recital could be held through this media?"

Sally Fay says, "Our church, St. Thomas More in Oceanside, is recording Mass each week and it's available online every Sunday after 6 AM. <a href="www.stmoside.org">www.stmoside.org</a> is the website where online Masses are available. We do include music, and I'm playing every other week. I don't have a lot of free time - I'm still working full-time with my day job as Software Engineer - we have been virtual for 7 weeks now and they are anticipating we will work from home through the end of May."

Kimberly Bedell says, "I am doing well and feel very blessed. My church job is continuing and I'm getting very good with PowerPoint, Garage Band, Dropbox, and Acapella. We have our services "live" over Zoom. I am very blessed that dear sweet Arvis H is a member @ King of Kings. She recently played a lovely piano solo for a service. I am doing some teleteaching which has been a bit of a learning curve as well."

David Lewis writes, "At Trinity, Escondido, we are doing much the same as you mentioned. Scott and I are pretty much staying up in the mountains at our little cabin. A perfect place to isolate. We rarely see anyone. That said, I went home last week and met a few people at church every night to pre-record some psalms, hymns and preludes with flute and violin. We kept our distance but is was fun and felt like we were in church. A lot of work but we all, three people at a time felt that the experience was very rewarding and spiritually uplifting. The "Viewers" on Sunday morning are really enjoying the music and especially seeing the inside of the empty church. We did all the music through Pentecost Sunday at the end of May, so I expect to not come home again till then. It looks like we will all be doing this at least through June and maybe a lot longer. We are all very concerned about the future of our choirs and bell ensembles. That 65 year old restriction will kill us."

David continues, "I spoke with Howard today and we both agree, along with everyone probably, that there is no need to make plans for AGO events for the remainder of the year. Especially if they involve paying someone. We can plan the October Scholarship concert since it is just us, and cancel if necessary. I think the chances of cancelling are very high. I'll contact our usual slate of performers to set a date at least. Everyone has been so busy and booked up in the past...this time we will probably have nothing to do! Even if we do not have the student auditions this year we can still raise funds for the cause."

Henry Doktorski writes, "Saint Martha Roman Catholic Church in Murrieta where I play on alternate Saturdays laid off me and many other staff. Luckily I get unemployment benefits as it was a W-2 job. House of Prayer Lutheran in Escondido, where I play on Sundays, is still paying my salary, although they cancelled a promised \$1,000 check to go towards my trip to Germany (now postponed two years) with the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians. I now go to House of Prayer twice a month with our Music Director/Cantor, Pastor, and Lector/Camera-person where we record two consecutive Sundays on video. On Sunday mornings the appropriate service is posted on YouTube for the congregation. To date, our Easter Sunday service has had 150 views.
